At the first location we visited, Rick Prinsen (my boss for the two weeks) introduced me as the president of the company to the woman at the grain facility (whose name I will not reveal to protect the innocent). Rick then began teaching me how to install the system, me taking notes, asking questions, etc. Soon, the woman with a curious look on her face said, "If you are the president of the company, why don't you already know how to

do all this stuff?" From that point on, I asked my "boss" **not** to introduce me as the president and just call me Michelle, because I wasn't quite sure how to answer the question.

After day one, I was able to install one of our newest products, AgVantagePC Grain Scale, all by myself. I think this feat sounds great on paper, but really, my people and the processes and documentation they sent with me were really good. I made mistakes, but they were in the form of wrong shoes and wrong clothes.

When we were loading PC's into our vehicles and then carrying them into the dusty grain facilities, we got some funny looks - me in high heels and

At one grain facility, when I was getting ready to leave, the guy working there looked at me and just shook his head saying, "come on". He brought me outside and sprayed me off with the air hose, because my fancy dress clothes were no

longer black, but completely white from grain dust. And even though he didn't know I was the president, but just some dumb blonde chick who doesn't know how to dress to work in a grain mill, he still got a little nervous when he got to certain body parts, so he just left those white. The two weeks working undercover revealed many things. First, what I saw were the strengths of our company - commitment from our people never working an eight hour day, but rather 12-16 hours each day. I experienced their "customer comes first" attitude and their ways of communicating in ways that I didn't even know existed. I saw Rick and Theresa spend seven straight weeks, juggling their personal lives, other customers, plus the customer they were working for, as perfectly as if they were two circus clowns juggling balls.

I also saw areas for improvement—ones that I would not have seen without being with them in the trenches. These are areas where we can bring our service up to an even higher level. We are now working on them together, as a company. I realized as our company is growing and changing, that there will always be new areas that need improvement. The key is to find new ways to excel, without losing pace on progress.

I was privileged to see what it takes to install our system from the customer's eyes. The time and commitment, the long nights, the patience to make sure all is balanced, the stress that comes with learning all new procedures and letting go of other habits. This customer was great to work with because they knew what challenges we would faced, but we solved them together.

When I think back to the woman on my first day of "Undercover Boss", the woman who asked me that innocent, but inquisitive question, I now want to answer her. "No ma'am, I should not know how to do all this stuff already. But I should spend time every once in awhile with the people that do know how to do this stuff. Because they are AWESOME." When working together, the team can solve everything, but with only one person, the challenges are much greater.

HISTORY OF THE DEPOT RENAISSANCE MINNEAPOLIS HOTEL

The conference agenda will be underway for the next four months and we will have a firm agenda by March 31st. The Depot Renaissance Minneapolis Hotel was an actual train depot many years ago. In the lobby and areas nearby, there are many white fiberglass statues of people who were workers or railroad travelers.

About The Depot Renaissance - History

History of the Old Milwaukee Road Depot

The last train left in 1971, but The Depot still stands as a monument to romantic, adventurous rail days gone by. For nearly seven decades, family members and loved ones stood at the atrium of the Depot and waved to passengers boarding the trains of the Milwaukee Road line. A prosperous hub of business and personal travel, this was the place where ambition set forth, destinies converged, and hearts became one.

1864-1899: Minnesota Central Railroad

The rail line, first built in 1864, was originally known as the Minnesota Central Railroad. In 1867 the Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad bought the Minnesota Central Railway, changing the name of the railroad to the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad in 1874 before shortening the name to Milwaukee Road. The old Milwaukee Road Depot was constructed in 1899 and remains one of the last long-span, truss-roofed sheds surviving in the nation.

Renaissance Revival Style by Charles Frost

The Depot, a Renaissance Revival style building, was designed by Charles Frost. Considered conservative in style, the ground floors were paved in white marble with black borders and walls were built with cream and brown enamel brick. The ceiling of intricately paneled oak gave the rooms a large, spacious feel. The total cost of the Depot was about \$200,000. The Depot fluttered with activity during the late 1800s when Minneapolis was a rapidly growing city. At the peak of activity in 1920, the prosperous Depot was bustling with 29 trains departing daily. In 1971, the Milwaukee Road terminated rail service to Minneapolis and converted the building into office use.

In 1978, the Minnesota Historical Society placed The Depot and the nearby freight house on the National Register of Historic Places.

The Depot Today

The Minneapolis Community Development Agency purchased The Depot and the seven-block surrounding areas from the Resolution Trust Corporation for \$2 million to preserve its historic significance. In recent years, there have been numerous development concepts for The Depot ranging from an agricultural museum to a casino. In 1998, the MCDA approved a land sale to CSM Corporation for the development proposal currently underway at The Depot. The finished complex includes The Depot Renaissance Minneapolis Hotel, the Residence Inn Minneapolis Downtown by Marriott, an indoor water park, an interpretive history center about the Depot, The Stone Arch Bar, Charley's Restaurant, banquet space, underground parking for 650 automobiles and an enclosed seasonal ice rink. The entire project was completed in July, 2001.

Cream Danish

2 packages crescent rolls

Filling

- 1 egg, separated
- 2 8 oz. packages cream cheese, softened
- 1 C. sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Mix egg yolk, cream cheese, sugar and vanilla together until smooth.

Topping

- 1/4 c. sugar
- ½ tsp. cinnamon
- ½ c. chopped pecans (optional)



Spray 9 x 13 pan with Pam. Line bottom of pan with 1 package of crescent rolls and spread filling on top of it. Cover with second layer of crescent rolls. Beat egg white until frothy and brush over top of crescent rolls. Sprinkle with cinnamon sugar mix. Sprinkle with pecans. (optional)

Bake at 350 for 30 min. Refrigerate 2-3 hours before cutting.
